

There were 135 present at the opening session, 98 at the afternoon session, and 50 at second day's session of the Auxiliary, with 26 points represented.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Mrs. Nellie Peters Black addressed the Auxiliary as follows:

"I cannot tell you how much pleasure it gives me to see you here and to bring you the record of our first year's work for the new Diocese. I see before me the faces of women who have never been with us heretofore, especially, one, Mrs. Slade, of Carrollton, to whom I have written many letters in the past fifteen years, and it is good for us to be together as one big family to talk over plans by which we can do better work than we have ever done before. I have prepared a statement in a statistical way of the official acts of your President, but if I were to attempt to tell you the story of each convocation meeting that was held, of the kind hospitality and cordial receptions that were given me everywhere and of the splendid spirit shown by the women of this Church all over the Diocese, it would take too long, but I cannot refrain from expressing my thanks to one and all who cooperated with me in my meetings, especially to Mrs. Lewis, our United Offering leader, Miss Rosa Woodberry and Mrs. C. M. Strahan, of the Baby Branch,

To give a summary, I will say there were twenty meetings held at which there were forty-four points represented, and five hundred and thirty-nine women present to whom I had the opportunity of speaking on missionary subjects. And now, my friends. I am going to ask you in this year upon which we are entering, to join me in a great crusade against ignorance and vice in our land. Let us go forward with the cross of Christ in our hands as the crusaders of old marched onward to rescue the world for Christ; let us gather the children around us in our chapels, our Churches, or our homes, and let us teach them what this Church stands for of uprightness, goodness and honesty of living. If in our small places you are the only woman who represents this Church, go out and look for one child, two children and more, who are not being instructed in any Sunday School-say "dear child, I want you to come to my house, Sunday, we are going to have such a good time together," and when the child comes, teach him the Calvary Catechism, then the Church Catechism or in that most interesting course of Rev. E. Blakeslee, which tells

you exactly how to keep a child's attention fully absorbed, then teach them how to sing a hymn, and as they leave hand each an apple, a tea cake, or candy, you will not find it hard to get them back another Sunday, and they will soon bring others to you. Then how easily they can be made into a band of Junior Auxiliary Workers. Don't let us say, "what can I do for the Church when we are so few and so weak?" when there is a child anywhere within your reach to whom you can teach the story of Christ, and you will be surprised to see how your own spiritual knowledge will grow, and then there will be a desire on your part to have a share in the still larger and greater work of the Board of Missions in New York. We must not fail to remember that every woman of this Church who has been baptized into Her fold is an auxiliary to the Church, even if she works alone, or in a guild or as a district member of the Woman's Auxiliary. We need cooperation, unity of action, a partnership of purpose, aims and object, -for the weak your prayers, your loving interest and then we know your gifts will follow.

I wish to congratulate you on what has already been done. Your Treasurer's report shows a decided increase over what passed through her hands in 1907 before the division took place, and we believe you will be ready to do your part in keeping up the pledge we have made for another year. The Benedict School needs your help—Rev. Mr. Phillips asks your aid in the Settlement Work at Unity Mills, LaGrange, and the Appleton Church Home of Macon, also needs you. It will give me pleasure at any time to tell you of their special wants.

I have been greatly grieved by the death of Mrs. Frank H. Miller, of Augusta, so long our Honorary Secretary, and now another loss has fallen upon us in the resignation of Miss Griffin, our Treasurer. She has been faithful and untiring, and we will miss her greatly. We all regret she is unable to keep the place.

I will be glad to have our Secretaries arrange to have convocation meetings as we can reach so many more persons in this way to explain the objects for which we work than in any other.

THE OPENING SESSION OF THE AUXILIARY.

Following the impressive ceremonies of the consecration of All Saint's church, the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, held a most interesting meeting in the Sunday School room. The roll-call showed responses from 29 points and an attendance of 117 women, with two representatives from sister branches of Detroit and Saginaw, Mich.

The Bishop's address embodied loving cheer and counsel. He extended to all present a welcome to this first meeting of the diocese of Atlanta, recognizing with such a goodly number present there could be no apprehension about earnest work in the future. He urged in all the mission work the uppermost thought must be to take it to the highest plane—God's service.

OFFICERS REELECTED.

He nominated the officers of the past year to succeed themselves, with the addition of Mrs. R. M. Walker to succeed Miss Theresa Griffin, as treasurer; Miss Edith L'Engle, secretary and treasurer of the Junior Auxiliary. Babies' branch, Mrs. C. M. Strahan, president, with Mrs. Alex Blair, secretary and treasurer.

The annual address of the president, Mrs. N. P. Black, followed, and is printed in the NEWS.

The Junior branch showed fine work, their pledges and gifts amounting to \$1,000.

Mrs. T. S. Lewis, the custodian of the united offering fund, gave, as usual, a fine talk on the importance of faithfulness in that part of the Mission work which supports 184 women in the foreign field, and erects a \$10,000 building every three years, where most needed for the sick or ignorant.

The Baby branch was represented by Miss Woodberry, in the absence of its secretary, Mrs. Strahan.

REPORTS READ.

The reports of the treasurer and secretaries, from all parts of the Diocese were most gratifying.

Mrs. R. E. Park offered a resolution that the secretary express to Miss Griffin, the retiring treasurer, the deep regret felt by the Women's Auxiliary that she is obliged to resign her office as treasurer of the Women's Auxiliary for the Diocese of Atlanta.

TRIBUTE PAID MRS. MILLER

The members were asked to stand during the short memorial service for Mrs. W. K. Miller, a former president of the Auxiliary, when the following tribute was read by Miss Rosa Woodberry.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta share with their sisters of the Diocese of Georgia their loss and grief in the sudden death of Mrs. Julia Kitchen Miller, our beloved leader and honorary president. Our sorrow is heavy over the loss of her gracious personality and enthusiastic interest in our councils, and our loss is very great in the deprivation of her able and consecrated service.

We beg to pay humble tribute to her strong character and ability and widespread usefulness. In her home life a devoted mother and wife, an ideal of dignity and womanliness; in her social life an earnest and wise worker in the Parish life of St. Paul's, Augusta, and then broadening out into larger fields of service in Diocesan and general Missionary work for the Master's Kingdom. Mrs. Miller lived a life of service to the King, and in this service gave to the world the rich benefits of remarkable qualities of mind and heart. We would dwell with especial gratitude and love on her work in the Woman's Auxiliary in its days of organization and strong development. As our president her wisdom and earnestness and generosity were a powerful influence in our growth.

Passed now from the Church Milltant, God grant her the blessed rest of Paradise and bring us very close in the sweet Communion of Saints and we kneel about God's Altar in the worship so dear to her, praying for wisdom and strength to continue the work that we have carried on together in the days that are past.

Following Bishop Nelson's address to the Council, and a few words from Mr. Reese, the Bishop of Georgia, to the members of the Woman's Auxiliary, that body was called to order by their President, who opened the second meeting of the session by singing Hymn 586. After the reading of the minutes, Mrs. Black analyzed the report of the Woman's Auxiliary, drawing a comparison of their work before and since the division. This half of the state shows creditable work in the sum reported. as always, good counsel in her advice to all baptized women in the Church, who were thereby made members of the auxiliary, to learn how to help more effectually the Board of Missions, which The Rev. is doing such a great work in all parts of the world. Everett Smith, educational secretary of the Board of Missions, was then presented and gave to the large number present a most exhaustive talk on the methods of study along mission lines, giving many helpful suggestions to the leaders of meetings, and recommended a work, just published, an accepted aid in explaning the work, "The How and Why of General Missions." Two suggestions were given for study classes; that a big open meeting should be a campaigning one for starting program work, to be carried on in smaller ones, where there should be a refocus He brought to the women of the to fit conditions and situations. Mrs. Black called for a report on Memorials, read by Mrs. Pettigrew and received standing. (See Memorial Record page.)

Rev. Henry Phillips, of LaGrange, was asked to speak on his settlement work at Unity Mills, and give a list of his needs; the greatest, he declared, to be women of common-sense and consecration to the work; to graft into the minds of the mill workers, the catholicity of God's teaching; clothing, books and contributions to the night school were more material needs.

Mr. Benedict had been obliged to leave, so that the report of needs of his mountain school were presented by extracts from Mrs. Benedict's letters, and were along very much the same lines as Mr. Phillip's.

An invitation was extended to attend a meeting of the Juniors of St. Luke's church at 3 p. m. Adjournment was followed by

a most delicious luncheon served to members of the convention and the Woman's Auxiliary.

The meeting then adjourned to enjoy Mrs. Black's hospitality in a beautiful afternoon tea at the residence of Mrs. A. V. Gude.

Miss Baylis, of Kingston, gave an interesting talk on her plan of reaching the luke-warm church people through the children in Sunday School work and her periodical distribution.

Mrs. Scarrett, wife of the Rector, of St. Stephen's, Milledgeville, spoke of the fine work of the workers, few in number, and The Spirit of Missions being the element in the nourishment of their small band to extend the missionary spirit.

Sister Louise spoke of the Appleton Church Home, and made an earnest appeal for consecrated workers.

Miss Rosa Woodberry was asked to speak on the pledged work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs, Griggs reported on the work of 10 women in their little Church.

Mrs. R. M. Walker gave an account of Norcross, and Mrs. Miller of the work in College Park.

A report from the De Graffenreid "dollar" was received and adopted, and Mrs. De Graffenreid was asked to continue her care of the fund.

REPORT OF MRS. T. S. LEWIS, CUSTODIAN.

I wish that this report was more encouraging. I wish that the day may come when I can bring you a real UNITED Offering, a record showing some amount, be it little or much, from every mission and every Parish in our Diocese.

This is the first report from the first year of this new Diocese of ours, and we have only one year and a few months in which to prepare for the General Convention which will meet in Cincinnatti, September, 1910, when your offering will be made. What will it be? Only a few hundred dollars, or a real generous gift, worthy of the great cause we represent. May I ask that each woman who is here to-day and every woman belonging to this Church will do her share in making up a sum of which we may not be ashamed when it is laid upon the plate. We have women representing this church in 62 missions and parishes of this Diocese. My report shows that seventeen points represented by twenty branches, including several Junior societies, are all that have had any part this year in the gift, leaving forty-five still to be heard from. We have nearly two hundred women workers in the mission field who are dependent upon this "United Offering" for their daily support. Shall we continue to care for them while they bring "the heathen to their inheritance"are we going to forget to provide our share of the daily bread. I leave this matter in your hands, and I have great faith that you will do your part nobly and well during the coming year.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

The Juniors since May 1907, when the Diocese of Georgia was divided, has shown a gain in membership and the amount of money given, but best of all we are awakening to the fact that our first duty is to aid the Board of Missions in its world-wide mission work. So each branch has had study, either as a regular study-class, or through stories and pictures found in the "Spirit of Missions." This year three day schools in Hankow, China, are to be supported at a cost of \$90.00, \$40,00 for a boys school and \$50.00 for two girls school, This will come within \$10.00 of meeting our apportionment. each branch is to give \$5.00 as their share, to be paid before June next. EXPLANATION OF THE JOINT PLEDGES OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY FOR THE DIOCESE OF ATLANTA.

UNITED OFFERING.

The United Offering in which every woman is asked to join represents especial birthday and other thank offerings, over and above general missionary work. This is presented triennially, and from it comes, through the Board of Missions, the means of supporting women workers in all parts of the field, to build schools, churches, and homes for the clergy, and to educate and train women workers, and the care of such workers, when sick or disabled. "To it we bring the incense of love, poured out in thankful gifts for special mercies, in memory of loved ones, for the ever daily mercies which bless us all. And if each woman in every parish gives something every day as she numbers her blessings, and with it the daily prayer, how near she must live to the Master, and imbibe of His spirit, thus helping herself, while the influence of such good work circles the whole church in loving deeds, spreads the Gospel, and hastens His coming."

THE EXPENSE FUND.

Each parish and mission is asked to contribute some little amount towards the expense fund which meets the expenses of the publication of the Minutes, circulars and report blanks, postage, &c., and also pays the expenses of missionaries invited to address the Auxiliary.

GUANTANAMO, CUBA SCHOLARSHIP.

A child is supported and educated in the large school of over two hundred students in Guantanamo, Cuba, by the Bishop Knight Scholarship, established at the suggestion of Mrs. Nellie Peters Black in 1905 when the convention met in Macon. This flourishing church school is most popular throughout that section of Cuba, and its opportunities are only limited by its endowment.

BIBLE WOMAN IN JAPAN.

Mrs. Hiratsuka is the native Bible Woman supported by Geogia women in Sendai, Japan. This was proposed by Mrs. Alexander and established in 1889, when the convention met in the Cathedral in Atlanta. As is well known, the duties of a Bible Woman are many and varied. She visits and nurses the sick, trains the women, has Sunday School classes, assists in teaching and preparing for confirmation, cares for the church furnishings, and is general parish visitor. A native woman is particularly valuable, when trained for this work.

BIBLE WOMAN IN CHINA.

The training of a Bible Woman in Wuchang, China, fits her for doing the same service among the native women as is done in Japan by trained workere. This pledge was also adopted at the meeting held may 1908, at St. Phillip's Cathedral.

BENEDICT SCHOOL, CEDARTOWN

Rev. George Benedict is devoting his life to the education and betterment of the boys and girls in the rural district of North Georgia. The needs are many and various, the cause a worthy one which appeals very closely to the hearts of those who have visited his school. Money and clothing are always acceptable.

THE APPLETON CHURCH HOME,

for girls in Macon receives orphan girls from baby-hood up to sixteen years—the children receive the best of care, the training, moral, religious, and industrial is excellent—the annual boxes sent from various churches are always most welcome.

BISHOP BECKWITH COT, ST. BARNABAS HOSPITAL, OSAKA, JAPAN.

This pledge was made at the meeting held in Atlanta at the Cathedral, May 1908—and takes the place of the one formerly filled by the Macon and Thomasville churches.

SETTLEMENT WORK-CHURCH MISSIONS HOUSE, UNITY MILLS,

LA GRANGE.

Under the direct management of Rev. Henry D. Phillips, a kindergarten for the little children of the mills, a circulating Library, and Sunday services with a Sunday School, are conducted with great success. Two women, supported by the United Offering, assist in the work—gifts of money, clothing, books and household supplies, are needed for this object.

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY MISSIONARY.

In order to mark the appreciation of the women for Bishop Nelson's choice of the Diocese of Atlanta as his Episcopate, Mrs. Black suggested, at a meeting held in St. Luke's Sunday School room, November 27, 1907, that we should raise \$600.00 dollars a year to be used toward the support of a clergyman to be known as the "Woman's Auxiliary Missionary." This suggestion was accepted with enthusiasm, and it was assumed as one of the "joint pledges"—after receiving the endorsement of Bishop Nelson.

BY-LAWS OF THE ATLANTA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Adopted Feb. 24, 1908.

I. This Society shall be called the Atlanta Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

II. Its object is by united and sympathetic action, to increase the interest, and unite all Parishes in the Diocese in the various branches of the Church's Missionary work, General, Diocesan or local.

III. All baptised women of the Diocese of Atlanta, who work for Missions, shall be regarded as members of this Society.

IV. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Treasurer of the United Offering, President of the Junior Auxiliary and President of the Babies' Branch, to be appointed by the Bishop at the annual meeting.

V. All Parish Societies in the Diocese, which so desire, shall be considered constituent members of this Society, provided they send their reports of money collected and work done for Missions to their respective Parish Representatives in the Board of Managers.

VI. The Board of Managers shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, the Treasurer of Special Funds, the Junior President and President Babies' Branch, Secretary of each Convocation and the Parish Representatives. Three shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VII. There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and the Treasurers of Special Funds, who shall have authority between regular semi-annual meetings, to appropriate funds in the hands of the Treasurer. Three to be a quorum.

VIII. Each Parish or Mission with a Society or Societies working for Missions shall be entitled to four Representatives in the Board, one of whom shall be their Corresponding Secretary.

IX. There shall be two meetings of the Board of Managers each year, to be held as follows: On or about the last Friday, respectively, in February, and the annual meeting which shall be held on or before the Friday following the Diocesan Convention.

X. One or more of said meetings may be also a general meeting of the Society, and shall be directed by the Bishop of the Diocese.

XI. The meetings shall be held in any Church or Chapel designated by the Bishop.

XII. Special meetings may be called by the President at the request of the Bishop or of any five of the Managers.

XIII. 1. The President shall call meetings and preside over them.

2. The Vice-President shall take the duties of the President in her absence

3. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society; send notices of the meetings, and keep a record of them; keep an account of the work done by the women of the Diocese, as reported by the Parish Secretaries.

4. The President shall report annually to the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in New York and prepare an Annual report for circulation in the Diocese, a review of which shall be presented to the Diocesan Convention.

5. The Treasurer, under the direction of the Board or Executive Committee, shall receive and disburse all money sent to the Society for any branch of Missionary work, and for the expenses of the Society, presenting a report of same at each semi-annual meeting.

XIV. The Parish Representatives to report through their Corresponding Secretary to the Diocesan Secretary all work done for Missions, and all money raised for Missions by the women of their Parishes; also all new work undertaken for Missions. They are to attend the regular meetings of the Board, and to carry back to their Parish Societies Missionary intelligence, and to endeavor in every way to increase an earnest and prayerful interest in Missions.

XV. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Board of Managers present.
