To PARISH OFFICERS:

You are requested to paste this page in your Auxiliary book for ready reference:

THE UNITED THANKOFFERING is the offering presented at each Triennial Service of the Woman's Auxiliary. The offering at the Triennial Celebration in October, 1922, at Portland, Oregon, is for Woman's Work in the Foreign and Domestic Fields, after reserving one-tenth as a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be used for retired United Thankoffering Missionaries, and a sum not less than \$10,000 for a building in the Mission Field. Every woman may share in the great Thankoffering. Mite boxes will be sent on application and gifts and pledges received at any time.

THE BISHOP'S AUXILIARY FUND is a general fund raised by the Auxiliary and placed at the disposal of the Bishop. At present he applies it to the support of women workers in the Diocese.

The Bishop asks every woman in the Diocese to give to this according to her means, that "The Bishop's Auxiliary Fund for the Support of Women Workers in California" may parallel in enthusiastic interest and generous giving the United Offering's great mission in the National Church.

Envelopes and Mite boxes, and Pledge blanks for Specials may be had on application to the Treasurer.

*The Fund must be increased to meet the growing demands of the field.*

DIOCESAN BRANCH EXPENSES: It is obligatory on every parish branch to pledge a definite sum to the Fund.

RESOLUTION ON ALASKA BOX WORK, passed by Diocesan Board May 27th, 1908:

*Resolved*, That Branches are requested to place no value on second-hand clothing sent to headquarters for shipment to Alaska Missions, it being understood that the packers will value such articles at rates at which they would sell as second-hand clothing and apply them to the Missions for which they are fitted, unless designated, crediting them to the Branch contributing.

RESOLUTION ON THE APPORTIONMENT to the General Board, May, 1912:

All moneys raised by Parish Branches for the apportionment made by the General Board shall be sent directly to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Auxiliary, as heretofore, the Treasurer of the Parish Branch being careful to report promptly this action to the Treasurer of her Church. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Branch will forward these sums to the Treasurer of the Diocese, stating amount given from each parish, that he may so credit it.

SPECIALS TO MISSIONARY BISHOPS should be sent through the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer, the Branch Treasurer notifying the Bishop and thus receiving his acknowledgment direct.

To SECRETARIES: Do not fail to report to Diocesan Secretary change of address or absence, or change in list of officers, as it is absolutely necessary to the success of the work that Diocesan officers should know at all times to whom to send notices of meetings, and other important communications. See that all packages are forwarded, prepaid. In case very heavy boxes are sent by freight, mail way-bill at once to the Secretary, who will forward to shipper bill for cartage from station. Send boxes for distribution by Diocesan officers to 1215 Sacramento Street, addressed to Woman's Auxiliary.

## THE ANNUAL SERVICE AND MEETING

The annual service of the California Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Grace Cathedral on Friday, February seventh at ten o'clock. Never before has an annual service of our Branch been so impressive, for in our presence was offered to God the greatest gift—the gift of life—Miss Thayer was set apart as a Deaconess. In his sermon on "Diversities of Gifts," the Bishop linked together all services as inspired by the same Holy Spirit, but bade us remember the differences of operation of which the Apostle speaks. Especially at this time when women have been doing such unusual duties in the industrial world is it well to recognize that in normal life equality of service does not mean identity of sphere—that there is a woman fashion of doing things as well as a man fashion. The Bishop traced the evolution of the Woman's Auxiliary as it has gathered up and developed all the elements of woman's service, companionship, devotion, organization; showing the growth of service in the woman fashion, of which the culmination is the offering of life.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by Dean Gresham, Dr. Parsons and the Rev. Edward Morgan. There were also in the chancel Canon Hayes, the Rev. E. G. Davies, the Rev. H. H. Shires, the Rev. E. A. McGowan, the Rev. R. H. Trelease and the Rev. J. A. Collins.

As usual a delicious luncheon was served by Trinity Branch in the dining room of the Divinity School.

At two o'clock the annual meeting was called to order in the Cathedral. After welcoming the visitors, the Deaconesses and the representatives of thirty-nine Branches present, the President read her annual address and called for reports from the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Secretary of the Junior Department, the Educational Secretary and the Chairman of the Hospitality Committee, and announcement was made that Miss Codman, having begun nurse's training, would be unable to continue in the office of Secretary of the Little Helpers, but that Mrs. Codman would take up that duty for the present. It was our great pleasure and privilege to have with us again our dear friend, Miss Soulsby, and to hear her address on woman's part in building the New Earth.

The dominant thought of the day was brought out and emphasized by the Bishop in his closing words. The offering at the service was, as usual, for the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund, and that of the afternoon meeting was divided, part going to complete the \$500 for the Wuchang Hospital and the remainder for the Lawver Memorial Scholarship at the Deaconess' School.

## ADDRESS OF THE RETIRING PRESIDENT

As the first months of the Auxiliary year fell within the term of my presidency, Mrs. McLeish has asked me to speak of that period, and I am glad of the opportunity, first of all, to thank you for the many kind words and good wishes that came to me from individuals and from Branches in reply to my circular letter announcing my resignation, at the time when I was unable to perform the duties of the president and felt that I ought to lay down the responsibility. I have already told you how glad I am personally, and how fortunate I think the Auxiliary is, in having Mrs. McLeish consent to take the presidency.

The Conference of Diocesan and Parish Officers held the day before our Annual Meeting last February, deserves mention because much more was accomplished that afternoon than at any previous conference. It was planned by Mrs. Gaillard Stoney to give opportunity for discussion of all aspects of our work.

Another splendid feature of our last Annual was the Junior Rally on Saturday afternoon planned by Mrs. Kroll. The Junior officers read their own reports, and a missionary play was given in which several Branches took part, and then the Juniors and their friends adjourned to the Divinity School and enjoyed a social hour.

The mention of missionary plays brings memories of our dear Josephine Clennell. How we miss Mrs. Clennell and Josephine! We cannot believe that England needs them more than California! And we still hope to see them here again.

There are other faces we miss today—and shall not see again here among us—Mrs. Theodore Tracy, President of St. Luke's Branch, of whose gracious presence at our meetings and helpful co-operation we felt so sure; Mrs. Herbert G. Pratt, the organizer and for years the efficient secretary of All Souls' Branch, Berkeley; Mrs. A. B. Coulter, who worked hand in hand with Miss Prevost in All Saints' Mission, Elmhurst; Mrs. J. E. Worn, President of the Home Branch; and Miss Mary K. Robertson, whose missionary life began in far away Greece, where her father was our first foreign missionary, and whose devotion to Christ and the Church was an example to us for many years.

In June I was able to accompany the Bishop and his party on the trip to the Salinas Valley Missions. I met with fourteen groups of women and found them full of interest in work for their own missions, and eager to hear of the larger work of the Church. In two places (Paso Robles and San Luis Obispo) they were ready to organize Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The General Convention, which I was privileged to attend, was, to the Church, the great event of 1919—the biggest, broadest, most progressive Convention of our history. The Auxiliary in its Triennial Meeting as well as the Convention, faced new problems of reorganization which in good time will work out for greater efficiency of service. And as in the war, so now in the Church work we are realizing that *Service is Life and Life is Service*.

Do you remember that next year the Auxiliary will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of its founding. And to mark such an important milestone in our history it was determined at the Triennial Meeting to establish, in thankfulness for our many blessings as Auxiliary women, a fund the interest of which will be used for the benefit of missionaries on furlough. It is to be called the *Emery Fund* in recognition of the lifelong service of the Emery sisters—Mary A. Emery (Mrs. Twing), the founder and first secretary of the Auxiliary, Julia C. Emery, for forty years the secretary, who established a Branch of the Auxiliary in every Diocese and Missionary District, and by placing the work on a high spiritual plane endeared herself to thousands of women all over the world, Margaret T. Emery, who so lovingly cared for the missionary boxes, and Helen Emery who

relieved the other sisters from domestic care and made a home where all missionaries found a welcome.

As it is our fiftieth anniversary, fifty thousand dollars seemed a psychological amount for our goal. It is the hope that every Auxiliary woman will have her part in this Jubilee Fund, the details of which you will hear later.

The launching of the Nation Wide Campaign, the great awakening of the Church, is the out-standing event of the year. It was the center of interest at the General Convention. The day of its adoption was a time of Pentecostal fervor. Its first period, culminating in the Every Member Canvass, is now being reported, and as we read of dioceses and parishes where the sense of individual responsibility to God has been aroused, we take courage afresh and determine to do *our* part, remembering that the Christian army can make no forward move unless every soldier keeps step and obeys commands—and the command is, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to *every* creature."

## ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT

Mrs. Monteagle has reviewed the work of the last year, bringing before us the two main phases of the Convention and the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The war work is now over, and the Nation-Wide Campaign has been a new call to duty and opportunity, and I know that the Auxiliary is ready to respond. But if we are to take up and accomplish even in part the work that lies ahead of us, it seems to me that we must make prayer an even more vital factor of our lives than it has ever been before. It is not the cause of Christ that has ever kept the uninterested from serving Him; it has been the weaknesses of you and me, and so I would ask you to consider the taking of one subject for our devotion each month—a prayer to be used daily, either one of the prayers of our Church or a simple sentence of our own, and it seems fitting to me that we should begin our work for this year with a prayer for renewed self-consecration.

The work of the Education Department ought to appeal to everybody for the subject for consideration is one that is on the lips and in the minds of everybody—Americanization. And if our Church is to take her place in this great movement, there is no better avenue of information than the classes to be held by Mrs. Holmes on the text-book issued by our Church. It is my earnest hope that her classes will be filled with devoted women.

As for our box work, there is to be larger opportunity afforded to us, and because of this larger work, and because we must relieve Miss Hawley of a little of the burden that she has carried so long, we have made a committee with Mrs. H. C. Wyckoff at its head to take charge of this department.

Last of all, we shall have a great deal to do in the way of giving money, but if we have caught even a glimpse of the vision of the privilege of service, and have realized that the only criterion is how much can we give, not how little, we shall be able to face boldly the person who charges us with materialism. The giving of our services and our money is simply the outward expression of our inward faith. It is part of our work to try to interest new people in the work of the Auxiliary, and the most constant objection to joining the Auxiliary from the uninterested is that they don't believe in Foreign Missions. By a happy accident as far as this objection is concerned, our whole endeavor this year is for the domestic and diocesan field, and I feel certain that any women whom we can enlist this year will have become so enthusiastic on the subject of our privilege that another year, when we return to the Foreign Missions, she will come quite gladly with us. In any case, it is our duty to make the effort, leaving the result to God.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

This has been a year of change. New conditions have confronted the Church demanding new energy and new plans. The Church has felt that reorganization of its work was necessary and the Auxiliary has endeavored to follow with a changed national organization to which, of course the California Branch loyally responds.

Within the Branch there has been also a change of administration. Early in the summer, our president, whose inspiring leadership has for twelve years had so much to do with the growth and progress of the Auxiliary in California, resigned her office on account of ill health. It is a great comfort to feel that while Mrs. Monteagle is relieved of the responsibility of the office, her interest will be ever with us and we may still have the help of her presence and counsel at our meetings. Mrs. A. L. McLeish has accepted the Bishop's appointment to the presidency, bringing to the work her clear insight, her deep devotion and the executive ability which has stood the test of positions of great responsibility. If the California Branch measures up to the vision and leadership of her presidents she will be ready to do her share in the world crisis now upon us. At the beginning of the year Mrs. James Otis Lincoln resigned the vice-presidency for San Francisco and in her place the Bishop appointed Mrs. H. S. Elliott, who served with her characteristic energy and faithfulness during the year and has now been obliged to resign on account of her removal to Boston. Mrs. Gaillard Stoney was appointed a vice-president with special care of the Educational Department assisting Mrs. Holmes.

The monthly meetings have been maintained, with fewer missionary speakers but more time given to consideration of the great questions before the Church and the world and our part in their solution.

Miss Soulsby was with us at the last annual meeting, and the Rev. A. R. Hoare at the September meeting. Again Bishop Nichols has given us generously of his time and thought in the annual meeting, the Quiet Day and the Altar Day Service. At the semi-annual meeting Bishop Parsons conducted the opening service and made a brief address. The December meeting was a service of intercession for the Nation-Wide Campaign led by the Rev. W. H. Cambridge.

As there was no mission in the Diocese that this year needed an altar, the Altar Fund was given for the furnishing of St. George's Church, Cordova, Alaska.

A new Branch has been organized in St. Stephen's Parish, San Luis Obispo.

The Alaska box went as usual in May, and through the co-operation of nearly all the Branches was a very valuable one, and brought warm thanks from the missionary in charge. The Easter and Christmas boxes were sent to one Domestic and four Diocesan Missionaries and amounted in value to about eight hundred dollars.

A strong delegation went from California to the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and brought back the inspiration of that great meeting and the ringing call for more earnest service from each member of the Auxiliary and for greater effort to draw into the work with us the large number of women who learned the joy of service during the war. May we all heed the call so that the coming year may see the best work that the California Branch has ever done.

## EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

### MOTTO

*"We must know in order to love,  
We must love in order to serve."*

The past year has been rich in educational opportunities in the Diocese of California. You remember how our Educational Department decided last year to co-ordinate the educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary with that of the Committee of the House of Churchwomen appointed to the Diocesan Board of Christian Education.

So in our annual report this year we can legitimately cover not alone the definite Mission Study Classes held during Epiphany and Lent, but the other distinctly educational activities promoted from our Diocesan center and participated in by our Churchwomen. Under this heading it is apparent that Dr. Powell's Bible Class on the "Missionary Life of St. Paul," held during Lent, should be a matter of record. The Church Summer School for teacher training, held in the Y. W. C. A. Building last June, the Asilomar Conference in July, and the Inter-church World Movement with its Normal Classes for Missions Study Leaders, its Junior and Intermediate Classes for teaching Missions in the Sunday Schools and Young Peoples Societies must also be included. Fourteen of our Churchwomen attended. Then our first Church Conference at Asilomar, last August, was a very definite and delightful opportunity for Christian education and fellowship; while the knowledge and inspiration that came from attendance at the Triennial Convention at Detroit, in October, which so many of our Auxiliary delegates and members were fortunate enough to enjoy, must count as distinctively educational assets of the year 1919.

But the year's cycle is not yet complete, for the most far reaching of all in our educational process has surely been the Nation-Wide Campaign from October to the present month under which in every Parish and Mission Churchwomen as never before were given intimate personal possession of a full range of excellent, well edited, well presented literature on the Church's whole sphere of activities; her needs, her opportunities, her great missionary commission and her declared faith and purpose in carrying it on.

The Parish committees in the faithful discharge of their duties in visiting and interesting others in this new challenge of the Church to meet the world's need of today found it necessary to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest that upon which they were asked to speak. The small army of "Information Men" and "Women," who Sunday after Sunday and at many week day meetings, went from Parish to Parish and Mission to Mission (incidentally glimpsing our own Diocesan life and needs and spirit) had to be thoroughly informed to present the subject allotted to them.

The Nation-Wide Campaign by "informing the mind and awakening the conscience" (you will recognize one of its slogans) has been a nation-wide educational factor in the truest sense.

The following definite Mission Study Classes were held during 1919, all using the text book "Ancient Peoples at New Tasks," which covered industrial and economic conditions and problems in foreign lands as stimulated by war activities and needs.

#### SAN FRANCISCO:

Diocesan House—Beginning early in January a Normal Class to develop leaders, held eight weekly sessions. The class numbered 20 in regular attendance with others as occasional visitors. The obvious results were a demonstration study class session given at the Diocesan W. A.

meeting in March, and excellent parish Lenten classes were held by six well-equipped leaders.

St. Stephen's—Under the leadership of Mrs. C. S. Todd, a study class using "Ancient Peoples at New Tasks," was held during Lent, with good attendance and much interest.

St. Paul's—The first class in this Parish, Miss Florence Langdon was the leader. Interest was created in those able to attend, but illness of several prevented the completion of the course.

St. Luke's— Here Mrs. Hugh S. Elliott was the class leader for a group of nine enrolled members.

OAKLAND:

St. Paul's—A Lenten Parish class of 20 members with an average attendance of 14; Mrs. H. S. Elliott as leader.

St. Peter's—A class of 14 members, average attendance of 10 (illness preventing regularity). This class was led by Mrs. J. E. Clennell, as in former years, and was eagerly welcomed and looked forward to, the members entering heartily into the discussion of the subject presented at each session.

St. Peter's—Held a Junior Class of 12 members. This was called a "Trip to the Orient," the children following the journeys on the map. A story was told at each session illustrating the life and industrial conditions of each country. Also many pictures were used. The story was then discussed and retold by one or by the whole class at the next session. Meetings close with prayers on special subjects suggested by the children. After Easter a play was staged based on the stories told, further impressing what they had learned. Miss Josephine Clennell was class leader of all this good and original work.

BERKELEY:

St. Mark's—Here Mrs. K. A. Bulkley led an excellent class throughout the winter season, carefully discussing the subject of the text book and bringing in much outside information which the class contributed. An example of good Parish study work.

Classes were also held at the Deaconess' Training School in Berkeley and at the Old Ladies' Home in San Francisco.

All the Diocesan classes combined to send a Junior delegate to the summer conference at Asilomar to take a course in Intermediate Mission study work.

About 75 copies of the text books were sold throughout the diocese.

## REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY

The work of the Junior Auxiliary has shown growth this past year. There are several branches which have not sent in reports and there are others which have done splendid work but according to our former plan it does not come under the following report.

St. Philip's, Fruitvale, has done much in the short time that it has been organized. They have sent a good box of toys, etc., to a home for sick children in Marin County. They have called for many Sunday School children who are too young to go alone. They are also taking charge of a club of young boys.

The girls of St. Augustine Mission, Oakland, are true missionaries. One or two of them go each week and read to the children at the orphanage. They, with the Sunday School, supply the Colored Old People's Home with oranges and candy at Xmas time. They have already begun their work for the Alaska box that goes next spring.

St. Mark's, Berkeley, besides their other work has sent \$5 to the Armenian and Syrian relief and also given \$10 towards their parish.

The Juniors of Trinity Church, Hayward, have done home missionary work by taking gifts to sick children, bringing others to the Sunday School, helping in the N. W. C. pageant, and have made many little articles for the Alaska box.

Under the new Junior Plan we hope to reach more boys and have all Sunday Schools feel that they want to do some week day work.
