





#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR 1930.

The past year has been one of readjustment for most of us; in the Diocese, in our homes, in our contracts, in our ideas of values. It is therefore difficult, in the light of these changed conditions, to estimate accom-

From the last Annual Meeting at St. James' Cathedral when Dr. Stewart preached the remarkable sermon which we shall never forget with its repudiation of the idea and the term "foreign missions," through our stirring United Thank Offering meeting at St. Chrysostom's in May with Bishop Campbell Gray as our Speaker, and leading up to the Quiet Day conducted by Bishop Edward Fawcett on October 9th, at the Church of the Mediator, the members of the Chicago Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary have shown their devotion by their splendid attendance, and the joy with which they were carrying on their task, by their cordiality and friendliness which was contagious. Joy in the face of conditions that seemed dis-

Your Chairman and your Vice-Presidents in our capacity as custodians of Auxiliary welfare, have tried to have always before us the resolutions passed at the last Triennial namely, that the challenge is to us as members of Christ's Body to interpret Him to our generation, and so have endeavored to remind ourselves and you that lives preach more than words. In visiting the different Branches, we have tried to place the emphasis not on increased membership, much as that is to be desired, not on larger Thank Offerings nor splendid boxes and generous gifts to the Church's Program, but on the manner in which we are witnessing for Christ in our prayer life, our Church attendance, our communions. The question we would ask ourselves is, are we women of the Diocese of Chicago as a corporate body and as individuals in our public and private witness helping others to a more complete life? Are we an energizing force in our Parish, in our community? We believe that many are.

As a preparation for their work, your Officers welcomed the opportunity offered them by the National Council of four days of Conferences at Taylor Hall last May. Here we drew inspiration from such leaders as Dr. Suter, Miss Lindley, Dr. Case, Miss Marston, Miss Beardsley and from other men and women of gifts and experience, also from the exchange of ideas with the exceptionally fine women who came as Auxiliary leaders from all parts of the United States. The theme for our discussion was "The Life of the Spirit in the World of Today," in our homes, our work, our student life, in race relationships, in rural communities, in mountain areas; as well as problems of growth in China, in India, in Japan and changing conditions in the Islands of the Pacific. A very comprehensive program, you'll agree. We came away with the conviction more firmly implanted than ever that it is the spirit that quickeneth, and an overwhelming desire to take back to you something of the knowledge and incorration of which we had been the fortunate recipients.

inspiration of which we had been the fortunate recipients.

Our always present problem of interesting the uninterested woman in missions can only be solved by accurate knowledge of missions, their needs and how to meet them. For this reason the Educational work has seemed to demand strong emphasis. Miss Marston's Institute held for two days in February was well attended and elicited spirited discussion, and Dr. Ludlow's Conference for Leaders held in October showed an awakened interest as evidenced by the presence of representatives from twenty-four Branches. There were gifts too from several Branches, would there were more-for scholarships at Racine and Madison, all indications that we are eager to offer educational opportunities to those who will embrace them. It would seem from present registration for the Institute now being held that about fifty per cent of our parishes will have Study classes during Lent and some have already begun. Our Leader for the Institute is well prepared for her task, having spent some time in India, attended conferences during the summer at Wellesley and restricted her reading for many weeks to literature pertaining to this study.

Our Social Service work under our new Chairman has taken a long step forward, as her report will show, and it is a hope that we cherish that ultimately every Branch will be conscious of the social needs of its neighborhood and be organized to meet them effectively, it may be by individual effort or in co-operation with other agencies, and that all will have knowledge, born of frequent visits, of our Church institutions. The interest and awareness of Auxiliary women should be felt in every question and situation of moment, educational, ethical, political. It has been a joy to us to know what response the Sister Sybelle met in her work with the women prisoners at Joliet, and now that she has been called to her reward for a life spent in His service we are happy that we can have a share in carrying on the work through the ministrations of the Sister Mary Elizabeth.

Surely the report of the Custodian of the United Thank Offering is an index of the gratitude and self-denial of our members when such a sum as this, only a few hundred dollars short of last year, has been given in this year of financial depression, especially significant too, when we remember the one thousand dollars given so spontaneously to the Diocesan Quota Fund as a memorial to our late beloved Bishop Anderson. Figures only half reveal the picture. The large number of blue boxes distributed, of which a good proportion went to new members, reveals the activity of the Chairman and the interest awakened. The allotments for the Advance Work are well in hand and we hope the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, the amount which we accepted as our share, will be completed by the end of May.

Our Woman's Page in The Diocese has been an interesting venture and it is hoped that it has increased the number of readers of that excellent publication, but it could be much more helpful and stimulating if we had one hundred per cent co-operation. Our former able Editor has been obliged to resign because of removal from the city, but we are looking forward to a better page as you become interested and realize that you are a factor in its success.

The Chairman of the Supply Department has told you of the necessity of changing our location and our anticipation that in the new loop office we shall see you all oftener. We want you to find it a convenient place to 'drop in.' We are also anxious to have a well-stocked emergency shelf and we want very much to specialize in altar linens both old and new for the mission field and to discover and train, if need be, groups of women who will make altar linens and possibly vestments. We would urge the use by Altar Guilds of the excellent Altar Guild Manual from the pen of Mrs. James De Witt Perry, the wife of our Primate.

Your Chairman has esteemed it a privilege to attend all of the monthly meetings of the Church Extension Committee and thus keep informed of the needs and the progress of the growing missions of the Church. She would like to become more intimately acquainted with the women in these groups and trusts they will give her the opportunity to do so. It is our hope that during the coming year we can have a Chairman of Rural Work which provision would enable us to be of real help in that field.

Attendance for two days as a delegate at the Provincial Auxiliary meeting of the Province of the Midwest at Springfield was a never-to-be-forgotten experience rich in interesting contacts and knowledge of the excellent work being done with our young people in our Mid-Western Universities as well as the problems of other groups and how they have met them and a resultant consciousness of our solidarity, our oneness in Christ Jesus.

During the Convention of the Girls' Friendly Society held in Chicago from October fourteenth to nineteenth, your Executive Committee was happy in co-operating to make it a success. The ties that bind this organization to the Auxiliary should be strengthened so that there shall be a gradual development of missionary knowledge, interest and responsibility in

the very young Candidate which shall cause her to unfold and blossom in her maturity into a well-rounded and enthusiastic Auxiliary worker. The operation of this same idea of transition which seems a means of assuring the continuity of the work for missions, was shown recently when a group of young women from a Junior organization of one of our large parishes, of their own accord, presented themselves at the annual meeting of the Parish Auxiliary and asked to be transferred to the older body. What better way can we find of producing the leaders of the future We are happy to report the formation during the year of another group of young women as Auxiliary workers.

When at our Board meetings which have been held during all but three months with a seventy-five per cent attendance, each member gives a report of her activity, it is a cause for gratitude that women are found so consecrated, so filled with zeal for their Lord's work as to make such preparation for it and take so much time out of their busy lives to speed the coming of His kingdom. Each Vice-President is expected to have a fairly accurate knowledge of the physical and spiritual condition of every Branch in her District and this means effort. It is hoped that you will turn to her for advice and counsel and let her share with you in all your successes.

We would commend the plan of appointed delegates to the Monthly Meetings who shall carry back reports of action taken and information or inspiration received. From experience we have learned, as we feel sure you have, that it is in this way that women enlarge their missionary knowledge and have their interest aroused.

Again we have been called upon to give up to a larger and fuller life our beloved Bishop, Sheldon Munson Griswold. His saintly example, wise counsel and gentle forbearance we shall greatly miss.

Your Chairman was honored in being asked to greet our Bishop, George Craig Stewart on your behalf, at the banquet tendered him after his election as Bishop Coadjutor.

In our new leader we have a great executive and a man whose soul is afire with missionary zeal. What a challenge to us! What an opportunity for increased activity! The quality that he will undoubtedly look for in us is the one he so richly possesses. It has been defined as "Enthusiasm, the beginning and the end of things worth while." What will our response be?

Your Chairman is grateful for your sympathetic co-operation and for your patience with her limitations during these past two years. Serving the Auxiliary has been a very real joy.

#### REPORT OF SUPPLY DEPARTMENT.

The allotments of boxes to be filled by the women of the Auixiliary during 1930 were for 10 personal boxes, 2 hospitals, 3 mission stations and 7 Christmas gifts to United Thank Offering Missionaries. It is to be regretted that we were obliged to return part of our allotment, though through the offering at the Annual Meeting of \$152.83 augmented by gifts to \$172.83, the department was able to fill quotas for St. Mark's Hospital, Liberia and

the Hare Indian School.

The Emergency Shelf supplied needs in several places and an exhibition of handiwork made by St. John's in the Mountains was successful and

\$40.00 was sent on to them.

The Vestment Committee of the Supply Department sent new and used vestments and altar supplies to seven Missions, some in our own Diocese and others in Minnesota and South Dakota. The value in money was about \$40.00, but that does not tell the value in filling the needs.

There have been reported 2,319 glasses of jelly, nearly 1,000 less than

last year.\* Please remember our dear families gathered in our settlements

and Church Homes when summer comes.

Reports have not come in sufficiently to be able to give the value of boxes sent.

A visit to the Indian Missions of South Dakota last summer, impressed upon your Chairman the need of the boxes by the consecrated men and women who are serving for us and in His Name.

This first year of my work as Chairman of Social Service of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese was spent in securing as much information as possible about the work that was being done by the various women's organizations.

In September I mailed a Questionnaire to the President of every Auxiliary in the Diocese. The result was very gratifying. Fifty-one per cent replied. Of this number, the interest in the Diocesan Organizations was manifested as follows:

Sixty-six and one-half per cent had a representative to the Church Mis-

sion of Help.

Fifty-six and one-half per cent had a representative to the Church Home for Aged Persons.

Fifty-six and one-half per cent had a representative to St. Mary's Home. Fifty per cent had a representative to Chase House.

Twenty-seven per cent had a representative to St. Luke's Hospital. Eighteen per cent had a representative to The Cathedral Shelter. Eight per cent had a representative to Providence Day Nursery. Twenty per cent were interested in Local Secular Charities.

This report speaks for itself. There is no doubt, but that the women of the Diocese are "Social-Service minded."

I have visited the Church of the Holy Communion, Maywood, and the

Church of the Holy Nativity, Beverly Hills.

This year of work has been an education to me. I have received so much more from contacts with this Board than I have given, that I feel very grateful for the privilege of being allowed to continue for another

# REPORT OF THE DEACONESS DISCRETIONARY FUND

HARRIET WINTER.

The City Mission Deaconesses wish to thank all who contributed to our Discretionary Fund, thus making it possible for us to help more of the individuals and families we are looking after outside of the Institutions where we first are in touch with them, who, on account of present conditions needed extra help, some of them for the first time, and had no one but their Deaconess to appeal to for temporary aid until they could again be self-supporting; we find all so grateful even for the little we are able

to do for them.

Eighty-eight Auxiliary Branches and Guilds, one Individual and the Members of "The Clerica" contributed in 1930. We most heartily thank the twenty-seven branches who increased their contributions, some even giving double the amount; (marked with \*) gladly we welcomed five new ones to our list (marked thus #) and six who had not given in several years; deeply regretted that five felt obliged to give less than in 1929, and that six did not respond at all in 1930. We are hoping that in 1931 all will again contribute for our City Mission work, as we missed them very much. With the one hundred dollars generously donated after the Diocesan Monthly Meeting in December, the total amount received was ten hundred and forty-seven dollars (\$1047.00), an increase over the previous years; even with this we were not able to help all who were needing it, and had to give less to those in all institutions we visit, (much as some of the people especially the sick ones needed the extras, we should have been able to give them) because of the greater help necessary for our people outside, such as, rent, board, coal, milk, groceries, extra bedding, shoes, clothing, etc., any of these taking more of our small allowance.

There are still seventeen branches that have never given anything to

There are still seventeen branches that have never given anything to the Deaconess Discretionary Fund, some in the city, others outside; surely all should feel they want and ought to have a share in this great work of caring for Christ's poor children, for whom the City Mission Deaconesses are responsible, as we find them in one or other of the twenty institutions we visit, or among those we keep in touch with as they go back to places

outside.

Everyone of you must admit we would not be following our Blessed Lord's commands if we cared only for the spiritual needs of our people. We should and must (if we do our duty conscientiously) provide for the material needs also when they are as urgent as now. Sometimes we find the father or mother in a hospital (if a tuberculosis one, it may mean they are there for months) worrying and so retarding their recovery, because they know those left at home are not able to provide the bare necessities of life for themselves. What are we to do? Visit them, listen to their troubles, and then be obliged to say, "Am sorry, but the Church does not give us enough money so we can help you," or are we to have a larger fund so we can at least do our share in helping them in their hour of need? The United Charities and other organizations have more families now on their lists than they can possibly care for. We must not shirk our responsibilities, but as far as we honestly can, must care for our own church people.

We well know that everyone is being asked to give to more things than a few years ago; our City Mission work does not stand still; it grows larger every year, so of course, do our needs increase, naturally more money is needed to meet them. We realize (that much as we need it) we cannot count on the extra gift of one hundred dollars (mentioned above) every year, so we feel we must ask every branch in parish or mission in the Diocese to give something to our fund in 1931. If you cannot give more than one or two dollars, send it, and it will enable us to help some

worthy soul we could not otherwise.

You may not know that the Deaconess Discretionary Fund (with the exception of about six dollars used for postage, etc.) is divided equally between the five City Mission Deaconesses, and is all the financial help for relief we can depend on; cannot you see that the amount for each one is very inadequate for even the most urgent needs of our sick and poor people. Take the cost of any one of the items mentioned above that we have had to provide, for even one family, for instance, a quart of milk a day for an under-nourished child or someone just out of the hospital has been ordered by the doctor, it costs over four dollars a month, they have no money to get it, so we must supply it, and there is not much we have left for others whose needs are equally great.

We are not getting even fifteen dollars a month each regularly, and we should have now at least twenty-five dollars as the minimum amount, and it is very hard to have to refuse help to anyone when we see how

much it is needed.

We feel, therefore, that you cannot blame us for speaking so strongly and pleading with all branches and guilds to do their utmost in 1931 to give even more generously (where possible) to our fund than in 1930, so at the close of the year we can report that not only have more contributed, but that the total amounts to at least fifteen hundred dollars, then we can say we have helped more, and refused fewer; and we assure you that not a dollar will have been spent unwisely.

## ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

STATE OF ILLINOIS, &ss. COUNTY OF COOK.

To James A. Rose, Secretary of State:

We, the undersigned, Marie M. Hopkins, Emily Pardee Street and Frances E. McDermid, citizens of the United States, propose to form a corporation under the Act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois entitled, "An Act Concerning Corporations," approved April 18, 1872, and all acts amendatory thereof, and that for the purpose of such organization, we hereby state as follows:

I. The name of such corporation is

"The Chicago Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council." II. The object of this corporation shall be: (a) To interest all of the congregations in the Diocese of Chicago in the different branches of missionary work, as conducted by the General and Diocesan Boards, and to the purpose of aiding said societies in carrying on the said missionary work in connection with the said Diocese and the said General Church. (b) An Auxiliary to the General Board of Missions and to the Board of Missions of the Diocese of Chicago of the Church known in law as "The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States," and its management is to be in accordance with the constitution and canons of said Diocese of Chicago and of said Protestant Episcopal Church and not for pecuniary profit.

The corporation shall have power to receive donations, subscriptions, legacies and bequests to be used for the carrying on of the said missionary work and of the said Church in the said Diocese of Chicago and of the missionary work under the jurisdiction of the General Board of Missions of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States.

III. The Board of Managers shall have power to organize branches or recognize existing branches in every parish or mission in said Diocese under the rules as they may adopt from time to time. Any branch so organized, upon payment of the Annual Membership Fee, to be fixed from time to time by the By-Laws, shall be entitled to representation at the meetings of this Board, each Parish or Mission voting as a unit when de-

manded by two Parishes or Missions.

IV. (1) The officers of the Society shall be a Patron, a President, not less than five (5) Vice-Presidents, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary and a Treasurer. (2) The Bishop of the Diocese shall be the

Patron ex-officio.

V. The management of The Chicago Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions shall be vested in an Executive Board of not less than nine (9) nor more than twenty-one (21) Directors, of whom the Patron, the President, the Vice-President, the two Secretaries and the Treasurer

shall be a part.

VI. (1) The Board of Directors shall consist of not less than nine (9) nor more than twenty-one (21) members, of whom the Bishop of said Diocese of Chicago shall, ex-officio, be one. All of the elective Directors shall be elected at the annual meeting of said corporation, which shall be held on the day after the close of the Diocesan Convention, except when the day falls on a legal holiday, when the Executive Committee of the Board shall appoint another day for the election of officers. The number of said Directors may, with the approval of the Bishop from time to time, be varied, and the Directors shall be elected in accordance with the statutes of the State of Illinois, and the By-Laws of said corporation, to be hereafter adopted. The Executive Committee shall meet monthly, except during the months of July and August.

(2) The Executive Committee shall have power, as necessity may arise, to appoint annually, with the approval of the Bishop, other officers, who shall not, however, be members of the Executive Committee.

(3) The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings of the Association and of the officers, to arrange for the organization of branches, to visit the same and to have the general charge of the work

under the direction of the Bishop.

(4) The duty of the Vice-Presidents shall be to choose one of their number to preside in the absence of the President, to co-operate with her in the general supervision of the work of the Association and to take charge of the departments of work to which they may be assigned by the Executive Committee.

(5) The duty of the Corresponding Secretary shall be to conduct the necessary correspondence required by the Auxiliary, and to prepare such reports as are needed. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to send out notices of all meetings, to keep a record of the same, and to assist the Corresponding Secretary in the preparation of reports.

(6) The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive all special and general funds; to disburse the former as the donors indicate, and the latter under the direction of the Executive Committee, and to render an account

of the same at the annual meeting.

(7) There shall be a committee of two appointed to audit the Treas-

urer's accounts each year.

VII. The following persons are hereby selected as the directors to control and manage said corporation for the first year of its corporate existence:

Marie M. Hopkins, President.

Katharine D. Arnold, Vice-President.

Vincy B. Fullerton, Vice-President.

Emily Pardee Street, Vice-President.

Eleanor M. Duncombe, Vice-President.

Jessie Peabody Butler, Vice-President.

Frances E. MacDermid, Corresponding Secretary.

Addie S. Chenoweth, Recording Secretary.

Emma J. Hoyne, Treasurer.

The said Directors shall hold office until the next annual meeting of said corporation and shall then be elected at the said annual meeting herein provided.

VIII. The Bishop of the Diocese of Chicago shall ex-officio be the Patron of the said corporation, and all of the acts of the Executive Com-

mittee and Society shall be subject to his approval.

IX. These Articles of Incorporation may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, subject to the approval of the Bishop, and by complying with the statutes of the State of Illinois.

The location is in the Diocese of Chicago, in the County of Cook, in the State of Illinois, and postoffice address of its business office is at No. 510 Masonic Temple, State Street, Chicago, Illinois.

#### BY-LAWS.

I. The election of officers at the annual meeting shall be by ballot, each Parish or Mission having one vote.

## Amendment to By-Law No. 1.

Beginning with 1928 and thereafter on the even calendar years, the first, third, fifth, seventh and ninth Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer, Recording Secretary, the Chairman of Box Work, the Chairman of the Social Department and the Chairman of the Department of Education shall be elected by the Woman's Auxiliary at its Annual Meeting, to serve for a term of two years.

Beginning with 1929 and thereafter on the odd calendar years the President, second, fourth, sixth and eighth Vice-Presidents, the Corresponding Secretary, the Chairman of the Supply Department, the Chairman of the Speakers Bureau and the Director of the Monthly Meetings shall be elected by the Woman's Auxiliary at its Annual meeting to serve for a term of

two years.

No member shall serve on the Executive Board (in the same office)

more than two consecutive terms.

The United Thank Offering Director shall be elected for a term of three years, serving through a Tri-ennial Convention.

II. When a vacancy shall occur in the Executive Committee by death or resignation, or removal of residence from the Diocese, the members of said Committee shall have power, with the advice and consent of the Bishop previously obtained, to appoint an officer to fill the vacancy. The officer so appointed to serve until the next annual meeting.

III. Special meetings shall be called by the President, at such time and place as he may designate, for the purpose of stimulating interest in

the work.

IV. It shall be the duty of every parochial branch to contribute annually a sum of money, the amount thereof to be determined by itself, to the Executive Committee of this Diocesan Branch, to be appropriated by them according to their discretion in the missionary work of the Church, which money shall constitute the General Fund of the Chicago Branch, and shall be so designated by the contributors.

V. The regular order of business at the annual meeting shall be as

follows:

Office of devotion.

Calling of roll by branches.

Reading of minutes of last meeting. Reports of officers and committees. Election of officers. Unfinished business. 4.

5.

Miscellaneous business and addresses.

VI. These by-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by a ma-

jority vote of the branches present.

Amendment to By-Law VI. The Annual Day of Prayer for Missions; the Annual Meeting; the Executive Committee and Monthly Meetings, heretofore held on fixed dates, will be subject to change, and for a sufficient reason may be held on dates to be determined by a majority vote of the Executive Committee, due notice of such change being given to all parochial branches.

VII. The Treasurer shall furnish bond for such amount as shall be determined by the Executive Committee, such bond to be paid for from the funds of the Woman's Auxiliary.
