In order to avoid further harassment such as the receipt of your anti-segregation literature today, let me say — that I have no respect for your underhanded tactics, your so called society or for you. Now if that is prejudice, then you must be audacity itself.

I am proud to be a teacher at Lovett and I have the utmost respect for our faculty, staff, and trustees. It grieves me to see a lot of trouble makers stir up so much damnation which could hinder the education of such fine students that we have at Lovett.

Now I'm only speaking as one individual Mr. Morris. I do not profess to speak for anyone else connected with Lovett. I believe in the American Constitution, in free enterprise, in freedom of association. I strongly oppose social mixing of the races and I most definitely detest forced integration.

Perhaps if you and M. L. King possessed more tact, I might find some good qualities in you, but when a person like King, who

has been in jail many times and accused
of being a Communist and has caused
Negro school children to flout the law
then the answer is - who do you think
you are kidding?

I hope that you will understand
by the nature of this letter, that I am most
forthright in stating my views toward your
letter of Jan 10.
